Patrick Ulloa is a fresh produce specialist with many years of experience in quality management, food safety, and postharvest. His long trajectory in the industry has allowed him to develop a broad perspective of quality and food safety systems at all levels of the supply chain. He has worked in almost every link of the supply chain, including seed marketing, research, production, industry development, wholesale, and retail. He has worked for important organisations such as Agriculture Victoria, Coles, Costa, and Driscoll's. Patrick is currently working on the Cherry Growers Australia's trade development project, which includes exploring export development opportunities and export regulatory compliance support for the cherry industry.

Over 80 Australian-grown crops now use phytosanitary irradiation as a biosecurity treatment for interstate and export trade.

In this role, he works collaboratively with industry and exporters to explore trade opportunities and promote Australian capability in priority international markets. Wayne Prowse – 2023–24 export summary: how did we fair?

Wayne Prowse is the Director of Fresh Intelligence Consulting. With a strong background in export marketing and analytics across FMCG, horticulture industries and government, Wayne established Fresh Intelligence in 2011 to help clients make sense of evidence-based trade data for strategic decision making. He is particularly interested in how global trade trends and disruptions affect Australian fresh produce export opportunities. Wayne will explore Australian and global cherry trade trends, insights and opportunities.





Caroline Barrett – AgVic Cherry Hill Traceability Project: the findings so far

Caroline Barrett is currently the Program Manager for Traceability at Agriculture Victoria, moving to Director of Primary Industries at GS1 Australia later this year. Caroline has led the Agriculture Victoria traceability pilot trials in cherries, citrus and table grapes. Caroline chairs the Working Group for the Agriculture Victoria \$15 million Transforming Traceability Program. With a background as a veterinarian and previous roles in meat and seafood (PrimeSafe) and FMCG (Mars Corporation), Caroline has wide primary industries and food sector experience.

Brett Fifield – Welcome address

Brett Fifield joined the grower-owned, not-for-profit research and development corporation for Australia's horticulture industry, Hort Innovation, as CEO in 2022. Passionate about delivering impact for Australian growers and the horticulture supply chain, Brett is committed to listening and ensuring Hort Innovation's priorities align with the horticulture sector's opportunities and challenges.

Before joining Hort Innovation, Brett was the Deputy Director General, Infrastructure, Investment and Business Development, and a member of the Executive Leadership Team at the NSW Department of Primary Industries in Orange. Growing up on a mixed farm near Wagga Wagga NSW, Brett began the early part of his career as a rural journalist and has since gained more than 20 years' experience in agriculture, including 10 years in senior executive roles working across agriculture, biosecurity, food safety, fisheries, policy and cabinet, business performance, communications and engagement.





Juan Pablo Zoffoli Guerra – Improving cherry quality in and out of the orchard

Juan Pablo Zoffoli Guerra is a professor of Postharvest physiology and technology at Facultad de Agronomía e Ingeniería Forestal, Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile. He has spent his career researching fresh fruit conservation and post-harvest handling. His work has enabled fresh fruit exporters to increase their productivity by using new technologies such as modified atmosphere when shipping fresh fruit to distant markets. In parallel with his work to strengthen the storage capacity of fruit, Zoffoli is also striving to increase resistance to physiological disorders such as internal browning due to prolonged storage times. He has developed practices and non-destructive protocols that can be applied at an early stage to ascertain the fruit's degree of risk of developing a particular disorder.



Ronald Vermeulen – The newest cherry training systems

Ronald is a Senior Fruit Consultant from The Netherlands with over 30 years' experience working in horticulture industries. He specialises in cherry pruning, nutrition, crop protection and canopy management systems. In his presentation Ronald will discuss the newest cherry training systems being used around the world.





Matthew Evans – Master of Ceremonies

Matthew Evans is a food writer, farmer, television broadcaster and chef. Based in Southern Tasmania, Matthew lives and works on Fat Pig Farm, a mixed holding where he tends a garden, makes cider, fattens the namesake pigs and tries to entice milk from two full-cream dairy cows.

Matthew's farming journey has been the focus of 6 series of 'Gourmet Farmer' on SBS, and he's presented 2 documentaries, 'For The Love of Meat' and 'What's The Catch'.

Matthew is the author of over a dozen books on food, including the authoritative ethical meat manifesto '*On Eating Meat*' and his latest cookbook '*The Commons*'.

He's an advocate for open, fair, accountable food and farming systems and has pushed for honest labelling so we can all enjoy sustainable seafood.



His latest book, 'SOIL', is a hymn to the remarkable and underappreciated bit of earth that gifts us life. It is a swashbuckling tale of soil that arms us all with the knowledge and respect to care about its health.

Matthew Evans speaks passionately about the myriad ways that food and farming can frame the future, including food security, soil health and the sequestration of carbon through regenerative methods. His farming choices are underpinned by a drive for high ethical standards for the land, for the animals, and for the community that drives it all. Fat Pig Farm regularly hosts educational programs teaching ways to make farming more sustainable, ethical, productive and conscious.



Tristin Kitchener – Positioning Australian cherries in the domestic and international market

Tristan is an ex-retailer, having previously held senior positions with Sainsbury's (UK) and Coles supermarkets, and is now a management consultant providing advice and support along the grocery value chain, from major retailers through to manufacturers and primary producers. He has a focus on fresh foods and was previously the Group Merchandise Manager for Fresh Produce at Coles Supermarkets.

Tristan has his own consulting business, Kitchener Partners Pty Ltd, focused on providing strategic and advisory support. Increasingly, Tristan assists businesses in understanding the implications of the changing retail and consumer environment and helps identify solutions to key business challenges. Tristan is a strong advocate for supply chain members collaborating more closely to better understand and meet the



needs of the consumer. He believes that this can be most effectively achieved by transferring learning from other markets and sectors.

In addition, Tristan has recently assumed the role of Course Director for the Produce Executive Program, a longstanding industry-led course that has been in operation for 25 years. He is also an Operating Partner for ROC Partners, a private equity business with over \$5 billion invested in Australian agriculture. Tristan is also a part-owner of Agricultural Networks, a packer, marketer and distributor of fresh cherries to domestic and international markets, located in Orange, NSW.

Tristan also manages and operates the Harmonised Australian Retailer Produce Scheme (HARPS) on behalf of the major grocery retailers in Australia (ALDI, Coles, Costco, Harris Farms, Metcash (IGA) and Woolworths) and Hello Fresh, Marley Spoon and McDonald's. HARPS is a retailer-led scheme designed to assist with compliance with food safety, legal and trade requirements for suppliers of fresh produce.

Tristan is a regular speaker at industry conferences and appears as a sector expert in shows such as Switzer Daily on Sky Business TV. He works with a range of businesses, including major and independent retailers, manufacturers, private equity firms, state and federal government and other SMEs. Tristan's formal qualifications include GAICD, MBA, MPhil (Horticulture Management) and BSc (Hons) in Biological Sciences.

Ian Goodwin – Narrow orchard systems

Dr Ian Goodwin is the Research Leader of Horticulture Production Sciences in Agriculture Victoria based at the Tatura SmartFarm. Ian has over 40 years of experience in horticulture research and innovation, with a focus on intensive production systems, crop water requirements and climate challenges. In recent years, Ian has led a team studying sun damage, colour development, tree physiology, crop regulation and water relations in bespoke research orchards, including the Sundial Orchard and the Agrivoltaics pear experiment. The new Narrow Orchard Systems (NOS) project will establish dedicated research orchards to investigate productivity and fruit quality in nectarine, apricot, plum, apple, pear and cherry. Trees will be planted at 2 m row spacing in narrow cordon-trained hedgerows using a range of rootstocks and canopy heights. Ag tech (e.g. autonomous machinery, sensing crop performance) will be tested, evaluated and demonstrated as a key component of the NOS project.



Nigel Swarts – Nitrogen efficiency in cherry

Dr Nigel Swarts is head of Horticulture at the Tasmanian Institute of Agriculture. He is interested in tree physiology and specifically tree crop nutrition. Nigel leads collaborative projects on nitrogen management in tree crop production systems and is currently supervising six PhD students. Nigel has a background in conservation biology and natural resource management with research focusing on rare and endangered orchids from across Australia. He has a strong track record in the field of orchid conservation with two highly cited review articles and a book published in 2017.





Dugald Close – Northern Italy growing systems

Dugald Close, former Centre Leader for Horticulture and now Deputy Director for Research and Global and Professor in Horticulture at the Tasmanian Institute of Agriculture at the University of Tasmania, has worked in nursery, native horticulture, trees on farms, and wine grape and fruit production horticulture for over 20 years with a focus on plant ecophysiology for yield and quality. Current interests include water, nutrition, and carbohydrate ecophysiology, including post-harvest science, as well as focus on growing systems and plant secondary chemistry of wild and crop species for plant extracts and essential oils. Dugald enjoys teaching horticulture at undergraduate and postgraduate levels at TIA and working with industry for practical outcomes.
